"Man's mind, once stretched by a new idea, never regains its original dimensions" – Oliver Wendell Holmes.

What is true of the mind is also true for communication. How much are we able to stretch it? There is a certain level of organic growth that is guaranteed for every member once he joins a Toastmasters club, provided he or she is regular and takes up speaking roles inside the club. You slowly shake off your trepidation and nervousness, start to derive inspiration and energy from the most appreciative audience you



can ever have. But how fast we grow in our communication skills will be determined by how much we stretch ourselves, how much we are determined to launch us outside of our comfort zones!

The next time you do a speech, do that in a way that is not your typical self. If you feel timid about body language, do something that great amplifies body movement. It might look odd, greatly uncomfortable. If you are accustomed to speaking in your natural voice, because that is what naturally comes to you, that is what you are most comfortable at, decide to speak differently. Start your speech high pitched and at a high volume, shock the audience! No, they are not going to be bemused at seeing an unnatural you, they will discern your intention to shed your old skin and get into a new mold! And you would have crossed a threshold doing that. It is always when we gather that courage to free ourselves from the pull of the past, the way we have always done things, that we enter a higher orbit, freeing ourselves to do even greater things, equipping ourselves with a higher vision.

So friends, every role that you take up, look at ways and means of differentiating you from the old familiar comfort zone that you have been accustomed to. Remember the words of Henri Bergson – "To exist is to change, to change is to mature, to mature is to go on creating oneself, endlessly".

Are you a *good* Toastmaster? Are you striving to be better? How will you become the best Toastmaster that you can be?

Continuous improvement holds the key!

PREPARATION

GOOD : Showing up on time each week to your club meeting.

BETTER: Showing up to your club meeting a few minutes early each week to help coordinate last minute changes and chat with members informally.

BEST: Showing up early enough to welcome first-time guests at the front door and help your Sergeant-at-Arms set up the meeting room.

In every situation you can be good. In order to be better you must seek to improve. Yet, to be the best you can be takes a commitment to excellence, a dedication to mastery. And it never ends.

PERFORMANCE

GOOD : Delivering your speech flawlessly from your script.

BETTER : Delivering your speech expertly, just from an outline.

BEST : Honing the ability to deliver your speech, as intended, with no notes at all.

GOOD : Answering the Table Topic with a cogent response within proscribed time limits.

BETTER : Giving a Table Topic response that has a beginning, middle and end and is also

entertaining, educational or thought-provoking.

BEST : Responding in a way that ties into the day's theme, energizes the membership and leaves everyone who heard it touched, moved and inspired!

Best doesn't happen the first time out. Or even the second or third time. But Better can! Each time out, you can strive to be better than the last time. When you make that your goal, it becomes foremost in your mind. Best happens over time, through repetition, dedication and diligence.





Continuous Improvement

"After 32 years, I am still learning. I still have areas in which to improve after all these years. Doesn't everybody?" So says Marion Keibel, DTM, past District 57 governor and 26 year member of Confidence Builders in Concord, CA (3972-57).

Marion embraces the concept of continuous improvement. Whether she accepts new challenges (like being part of the team rebuilding AdPro (400-57) as a weekly club), whether she continues to hone her mastery as a speech evaluator, even after winning multiple District evaluation competitions, she always finds room for improvement. And we can too. This is the spirit of *kaizen*, the Japanese concept of continuous improvement. As Toastmasters, when we dedicate ourselves to continuous improvement, we become KTMs—Kaizen Toastmasters.

A Tiger Among Us

Keibel's example of continuously improving as a speech evaluator, even after winning her District's contest, raises the bar for the rest of her District. You see, in any endeavor, to BE the best, you have to BEAT the best! Both Marion and her District competitors improve when they compete head-to-head in their semi-annual contests.

Consider the greatest golfer his era, Tiger Woods. He was so far ahead of the field, the field had to raise its game just to remain in the hunt. And so they did! They become better to compete against the best. And Tiger benefits from the improving competition and raises his golf game still further.

Whether you strive to be best of class, or strive to achieve your personal best, your quest is never-ending.

SUPPORTIVENESS

GOOD : You always agree to speak when your name comes up on the agenda scheduler.

BETTER : You also agree when you're asked to be Timekeeper or "Ah" Counter.

BEST : You fill in at one minute to starting time when asked, to cover a vacated role due to

a no-show.

This concept of continuous improvement applies to every aspect of our meetings. Consider the role of mentoring:

MENTORING

GOOD : You agree to mentor a new member and invite your mentee to call you whenever he or she has a question.

BETTER : You establish regular opportunities to meet and review the progress of your mentee and answer any questions that arise.

BEST: You not only answer questions posed, but also suggest new opportunities, future roles and additional challenges that you know exist "over the horizon." In this way, you chart a course for their matriculation through the Toastmasters curriculum.

COACHING OTHERS

GOOD : You are praiseworthy in your official evaluation of the speaker at club meetings. BETTER : You blend praise with recommendations for growth, constructively phrased.



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BEST: You blend praise with recommendations, shared publicly, while withholding sensitive suggestions for sharing privately with the speaker.

Sometimes our best efforts are actually found below the waterline. Consider the iceberg. We see the tip of it above the surface. Yet 90% of its mass is found below the waterline where few can see it. As leaders, the public often sees the small percentage of our efforts while the other 90%, our blood, sweat and tears devoted to excellence, is invisible.

Consider all the time and effort that goes into planning a District conference. Rather than judge a conference by how well the conference chair speaks from the platform, consider all the many facets that went into creating the optimal event for everyone.

PLANNING EVENTS

GOOD: A Fall or Spring District Conference where attendance is high, the business meeting is conducted efficiently, and the conference runs on time.

BETTER: A conference where first-timers want to come back, contests are stirring, keynotes memorable and the Communication and Leadership award winner's speech inspires others.

BEST: A conference in which the standard for excellence is raised, members buzz about it for years (like the 2008 opening ceremonies of the Olympics in Beijing), and the momentum from the conference fuels excellence in the entire District's critical success factors that year and beyond.

Kaizen Complements Toastmastering

Continuous improvement is a concept near and dear to Toastmasters' hearts. We don't just devote a week or month a year to improvement. A third of *every* meeting is devoted to analyzing what we did well, what we can do better and how we can, as a group, achieve greater results for our club and its members. This, in its essence, is the Japanese concept of Kaizen—continuous improvement.

According to Chuck Reaves, CSP, CPAE, CSO, and author of *Kaizen for Sales* and *The NANOSECOND Salesperson*, "Continuous improvement in every endeavor, especially in speaking, is a worthy pursuit. Words are powerful tools that can create, improve or destroy, depending on how effectively they are deployed. As you speak and lead more effectively this year than last, and better next year than this year, your successes will grow resultantly."

Most improvement doesn't come from quantum leaps. It comes from incremental improvements over time. A little better today than yesterday, over time, leads to great improvements, whether in speaking, leading, learning or life.

When you commit to continuous improvement it permeates everything you do and infuses how you live your life. Vow to make each act, each event, each effort your best yet. Then you know, in your heart, that your best is yet to come!

An Interview with a Storyteller

DTM Craig Harrison, describes himself as a storyteller. On his recent visit to Kochi, we had the privilege of having him as a guest, for the 284th meeting held on 14th of December 2014 at Travancore Toastmasters Club. It was an inspiration to have him in our midst. And taking on the role of a General Evaluator for that meeting was the highlight of the meeting. He was highly effusive of the whole show and perhaps a little cautious in pointing out our flaws. But there was great bonhomie and all the members interacted with Craig long past the meeting was over. He obliged us with an interview into his journey as a very active



Toastmaster and master storyteller. The responses that we got were remarkable, thought provoking and invaluable. More than that, we got a glimpse of how a shy, self-conscious person who could not express ideas, went on to become a DTM. Here are the excerpts of the interview.

"The skilled communicator opens doors, builds new relationships, serves others effectively and enhances one's own leadership." What does it mean to be a "Skilled" communicator?

The skilled communicator listens as well as speaks, initiates contact with strangers to build rapport, trust and understanding, and combines communication skills with leadership to shape our world. When you can listen to what is said, what isn't said, what is implied and become in sync with others, as well as express your own thoughts, ideas and intentions, you can partner with others for success.

Skilled communicators blend substance with style in their communication. They connect on a heart level as well as intellectually with their conversation partner. They can convey visions, inspire others, move mountains and make the impossible not just possible, but fun to achieve.

What was your motivation to become a TM? How did you get into Toastmasters and how long did you take to get to DTM?

As an adult I was shy, self-conscious, and unable to express my ideas effectively in work

or social situations. I was a fumbling, bumbling, mumbling mess who was afraid to give others eye contact and was nervous in public. I needed Toastmasters but didn't know it. Like most who join, I sought help for communicating with confidence. I had no idea about the leadership track, or that I could pursue both simultaneously. I fell into club leadership by accident, after joining in July, 1992, filling the void of president within 6 months of joining. Was I ready? NO. Did others work with me? Thankfully!!! Leadership, the track less traveled in Toastmasters, gave me many opportunities to apply communication lessons I was learning. I kept saying "Yes" to Area Governor, Division Governor, entering contests when asked, and more, and found rewards for each. I became a DTM and District Governor as I entered my 4th year as a member. Toastmasters changed my life. It helped me break into management, change careers, get published, write books and ultimately start my own company. And it can for you too, whatever your ambition.

We all know that being a Toastmaster has its advantages, challenges and opportunities. Having got to the pinnacle, what is it that you consider as the



most important impact / influence TM had on yourself?

As I've matriculated through Toastmasters I became less "self-centered" and more othercentered. When I put others first and advocated for their success, mine came too. Servant leadership has served me well. as empowered others I've grown in stature as well. I came to realize the pleasures of giving to others, empowering them, helping them break through barriers, launching them into leadership, is really gratifying.

I don't consider myself "at the pinnacle." Each year I complete another CC for my clubs. My relationship changes each year with the organization and my clubs as I change roles from achiever to mentor, champion to coach, strategist, grooming others. speaker to coaching incoming leaders, conceiving of exciting conference formats and the like. I try to bring value to my club, district and others through articles, informal and formal coaching, nurturing the spark in others to nudge them into leadership.

What would be your message to a would be Toastmaster?

Become a Competent Communicator, both the Communication and Leadership tracks simultaneously, select a Mentor and commit to excellence, and write down and share your professional and personal goals with your club and district leaders. When you go public with your goals you find the world will rise up to support you in your quest for success. In time each milestone of yours, once achieved, becomes a stepping stone to future goals. Whether you want to start a company, run for office. write а book. win the Championship of Public Speaking or build new Toastmasters clubs for your community or organization, it's all within your reach. I asked, "What is Sun Award?" He said, "It is like an Oscar award! It is instituted for recognizing the best performers for their 'Outstanding Achievement' from among the companies in the ADITYA Birla Group, worldwide!" Idea Cellular Kerala, where I work was part of the Aditya Birla Group.

He continued, "It happens in Mumbai, Grand Hyatt Hotel. There are three companies qualified for the final, including ours. If we make an impactful presentation, we could win the Sun award." As soon as I heard it, pressure started building up inside me like in a pressure cooker!

The obvious! reasons were quite The distinguished audience consisted of Managing Directors, CEOs and Executive Presidents of all the Aditya Birla Group companies from all around the world - from US to Australia, Singapore to South Africa and Indonesia to India. My boss, his boss, his boss, and his boss...Mr. Kumaramangalam Birla, the Chairman of the group would be there. The presentation had to be made in front of these

awe-inspiring top-brass in business suits, which made the air very formal. Imagine 600 "Evaluators" sitting in a big hall!

Let me introduce to you the real 'Evaluators', the jury members, who would be judging our presentations and declaring the winners:- The Chairman of Kotak Mahindra Bank and the Managing Directors of Hindustan Uniliver, Microsoft India & Bata India.

Another pressure point was the aura created by the high profile speakers invited for the conference which comprised of Mr. Kofi Annan, former UN Secretary General, Mr. Jimmy Wales, the founder of Wikipedia and the tennis legend Steffi Graf. We would be using the same stage from where they delivered their speeches!

And then the stage - I had never seen a stage of that size! It would take at least a minute to walk from one end to the other!

The weight of expectations from the team, back in office was unbearable. One of them said just before we were leaving for Mumbai, "Our performance of two years, has been giftwrapped like a Christmas gift and given to you. You need to just go and deliver it". I told him, "How simple!" I knew the risks. It is a big occasion. A failure on stage was going to be fatal on my career.

The 'D' day came. The presentation was loaded. The stage was brightly lit. The spotlight was on. There were two big screens in the hall on which the presentation slides were shown. The programme was broadcasted live across the world through internet for all the employees to watch.

I got up and walked confidently to the podium and started with a bang. The opening lines came off quite well. Then, I became quite comfortable and began enjoying my



speech. Then a magical moment was born, while I was speaking about our business achievements. The audience responded unexpectedly with an applause. I took a pause, cherished the moment and acknowledged their good gesture.

After the presentation, a lot of people came up and said, "Great presentation!"

The next day evening was the Sun Awards Ceremony. We were seated in the last rows, from where the stage was hardly visible. The interest and

anticipation had reached a feverish pitch. I asked myself, "Will we get the Sun tonight?" Then, I turned to my colleague who was sitting next to me and asked, "Will we get the Sun tonight?" He said, "Don't worry. If you do not get the Sun tonight you will surely get the Sun, tomorrow morning"

Then the award was announced. "The Sun award goes to ... *Idea Cellular Kerala!*". We leapt up and screamed, Yeeeaaah! Yes! I had won my Oscar!

Then I realized, it was not me, but the Toastmaster in me who has won the award. I

consider my achievement as a triumph for all Toastmasters.

All of a sudden I recollected the bird flu thing she had so seriously warned me of. Wave the sails (Save the whales)

Beeping sleauty (Sleeping beauty)
The pea little thrigs (The three little pigs)

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Fall from Paradise! Basil Joseph



It was like a long cherished dream coming true! My wife Lovely and I had meticulously planned our visit to the exquisite paradise of tourists - the Golden Land of Kashmir - during September along with our immediate circle of closest family friends. The news of air ticket confirmation arrived by then, filling us with a streak of excitement. After the exhaustive hustle-bustle of packing up, we soon found ourselves at the airport, ready to take off. As we touched-down the 'Golden City' of Srinagar, we could feel a friendly warmth that instantly made us comfortable. Everyone was excited. Now is the time to explore the Heaven on Earth! Its beautiful lakes and gardens are a photographer's delight! God himself decorated Srinagar with his best designed flowers!

On the first day after arrival, we stayed in a beautiful house-boat in the vast yet calm 'Dal' lake. How can I forget the brightly coloured 'shikaras' floating their way amongst the uncountable pink and white lotuses, as far as human eyes could see! The sight will surely leave anyone mesmerised! The clouds smiled at us through the Lake.

On the second and third days, the sky was more or less cloudy. Our plans to proceed to Pahalgam and Gulmarg (both in different directions) on these days had to be called off, since the vehicle could not proceed as the roads near these hill stations were flooded. We were stuck up in the hotel. By noon on the fourth day, we changed hotel as per the tour plan to 'Center Point Hotel' near 'Dal' lake. There, we observed that water level in the lake was gradually going up hour by hour. Many lower plains and smaller buildings were slowly being flooded with water. Strangely enough, there was hardly any rain in Srinagar area! On enquiry, we came to understand that a river called 'Jhalam', was flooded with water from its catchment area where there continuous heavy rain. A bund had also broken somewhere.

We were relieved that the immediate premises around 'Center Point Hotel' where we stayed had no sign of any flood whatsoever; everywhere we could see dry roads. We thought that we were safe. By evening, things changed. There was an unprecedented buzz. Local people were gathering in the streets and 'mu<mark>rm</mark>uring' and talking in 'hush-hush' voices about some imminent danger. With a shock we realised that something bad was going to happen. Local residents including ladies and children rushed out of their homes carrying their baggage looking for safer places. Obviously, people were in panic! By 6 PM, flood water surged like a silent terminator and surrounded our hotel. By midnight, it submerged the lower floor of the hotel and the generator stopped working. Power supply tripped. Next moment, the entire communication system with outside world snapped abruptly and we found ourselves totally isolated in the pitch darkness of night. We were gripped with fear and anxiety.

Totally scared, we gathered in my room on the 4th floor and discussed for hours on various options to escape from the hotel and Kashmir valley. Meanwhile, torrent water was



swelling higher and higher. We soon understood there were dozens of other Malayalee families under different tour operators, besides the six of us. A total of 72 people were trapped in our hotel including 2 Polish, 3 Japanese and few North Indian families besides the hotel staff. Next day morning we saw the 'Reception Counter' of the hotel floating in water! Cars and jeeps were immersed in water.

Thanks to the hotel staff, entire provisions and cooking gas were shifted to the first floor the previous night. Malayalee ladies from Calicut led by one Mrs. Thampi took control of cooking. While serving food, I made an announcement on the necessity of controlling water and provisions, because we had to survive on whatever we had. We can survive for one week without food, but not without water! I also convinced people not use flush in the toilet. Even a single drop of water was precious and had to be preserved. Two persons were assigned to strictly regulate the water supply. We took stock of provisions and served "brunch" and only light dinner for the next two days. 'Chapattis' and curry were given in bare hands to avoid washing of plates to save water. My leadership experience gained 'Reverberations 2012' helped me coordinate the activities better.

In the nearby buildings, almost all the people stood on the roof top showing red flags for helicopters help. We also started crisis management. Room No.102 was converted into a control room. Mr. Lijo (TCS) took control over the communication department and stood almost all day and night on the roof-top watertank to get the mobile signals to seek any possible help from Delhi or Kerala.

Stock of provisions and water diminished to critical levels by 3rd day. By noon we got a small boat and one Mr. Jony from Tripunithura, bravely oared it to reach the main road. He came back with a new enthusiasm and

explained that if we could walk about 7 kms towards 'Rajbhavan' on the nearby hill, we could get Army helicopter service to Srinagar. Immediately hotel owner brought a "Shikkara' (country boat) and evacuated all people through the 1st floor window. Ladies and children were evacuated first followed by senior citizens. I was one of the last persons to vacate the hotel after ensuring that all the families and their luggage had safely reached the main road.

What I explained was only an episode. When we reached Rajbhavan walking all the way, the scene was even more heart-rendering. The long serpentine gueue of men, women, babies and pregnant women extending to several kilometers!! This was controlled by Army, BSF, CRPF & Air Force personnel. For the first time in my life I could see the discipline and efficiency of our armed forces at its best! Like at the warfront, Jawans with fully loaded heavy machine guns were patrolling the area in armored vehicles where thousands of people were waiting so patiently, braving the hot day and chilling night without shelter or even toilet facilities! We came out from the queue, searching for a shelter to stay, but there was no hope. Then the miracle happened! I saw a heavily protected CRPF MT workshop compound where a young Jawan stood guard in front of the gate. He was a Malayalee -Unnikrishnan from Calicut! . He empathized with us and took us to an abandoned CRPF truck parked outside. We stayed for next 2 days in the truck. That, we felt, was indeed like a 7 star facility for us, compared to thousands of people squatting on the roadsides and under the trees! God had mercy on us!! Unnikrishnan was kind enough to give us blankets and food for 2 days from their mess. He took special permission from his officer to allow us to use one toilet in the camp.

On the third day we flew to Srinagar by an MI 17 chopper arranged by the Army authorities. From Srinagar we were transported to



Palam Air base by an IAF AN 32 Military aircraft. While waiting in the helipad, I volunteered to lend a helping hand to unload food packets intended for the relief operation from the chopper along with BSF Jawans. That humble gesture was an indirect expression of my sincere thanks and gratitude to our CRPF, BSF, Indian Army and Indian Air Force personnel for their unmatched service in the relief operation which alone made our escape from the valley possible! Long live Indian forces!!

Finally a 'thank you note' to you, Toastmasters!! Please accept our sincere thanks and gratitude

- from Lovely and me - for the prayers, concern and affection shown to us during this ordeal, which kept our spirits high during those desperate moments! Your inspiring words were fuel for recharging ourselves. I'm proud to be part of this exquisite group and glad to be back to tell you this story of our 'Escape from Paradise'.

But the stark contrast of the picturesque scenes of the first two days of the trip, with the harrowing experience of the remaining seven days, still haunts me!

For reasons unknown, we believe or choose to believe that a resolution for change should coincide with a great event. And which event could be better than New Year? That moment, when the clock strikes 12 at midnight on December 31st, with a glass of spirit to motivate us, feet touching the ground yet you hardly aware of it, in an inebriated ecstasy, we cajole ourselves to take that decision. And when we wake up the next day, with a heavy hangover, we scratch our heads and ask ourselves "What was that resolution I took vesterday?"

Rain does not wait for the rainy season. On the contrary, when it rains, we call it the rainy season. Change does not wait for any season,

event or day. When it is time for a change, it happens. Nature has it that things cannot remain static or unchanged. Everything around us changes and grows by its predestined cycle of change. (Darwin called this evolution, humans try to resist it). Every growth or change will prompt further growth and change. You and I are a part of the cycle whether we realize it or not. What we do not realize is that you and I have this unique capability of choosing our own change unlike any other animal in the universe. Perhaps, it is because we are created in the image of the supreme, with the divinity to choose our own destiny. But, do we exercise this choice with wisdom? When we have a glass in our hand, when we hear the clock chime to ring in the New Year, is that choice made with proper thought?

Ask a woman, did she choose the time and day when she became a mother? When that change happened, that day became most auspicious for her, not because of the date or time. She would have prepared for this in anticipation. Nature would have prepared her for this change. She would have gone through anticipation, doubts, uncertainty and pain. And when the change happened, that time and that date turned out to be most auspicious for her. Not because of a resolution, or a decision to make a change on that day; but because she is prepared for that change. The male can argue that he caused this change. In the whole scheme of that change, perhaps any other male could have done that role! And agreeably, it is a very minor role!

Think about the time when one got married (those who are not married can think about the day they will get married!). We were waiting in anticipation, we were anxious, were we preparing ourselves. expectations and excitement in the air. In short, we were choosing the change very consciously. We were exercising our capability to choose. (Or at least we think we have a choice, although after that day, a lot of choices are made for us, and we accept them even when we do not like them!!) And when that happened, we kept the



day as the turning point in our life. A time when we found our better-half, or maybe, we became the better-half of someone else. Do we remember that day because of the uniqueness of that day & time or because of the uniqueness of the change that happened on that day? Well, 10 years down the line, with a few kids, mortgage etc, the story may be different. We may then be thinking, "How did I let that happen?" Nevertheless, the change did happen because of a conscious choice and action towards fulfilling it.

In fact no change happens until we consciously make a start and are ready to face its challenges fair and square. It has nothing to do with day or time. Preparation, mental anticipation, uncertainty, shedding of the old and embracing the new, all of these go with the process of change. Are you waiting for the right moment to make the change? The right moment is now and not tomorrow or the New Year eve. The vital questions to be answered before

making resolutions for change are: a) Are you ready to prepare yourself sufficiently before the change? b) Are you willing to go through the uncertainty that is inherent in any change? c) Are you willing to shed the old for the new and embrace the new? d) Are you willing to take the pain of the change? e) Are you willing to risk the possibility of failing and still push yourself to move forward to achieve success?

Change does not favor the strongest or the smartest; it favors the one who is prepared for the change. So the next time you want to make a change, ask yourself the above questions and evaluate the strength of your own intent, motivation and readiness for change. Once you are ready, make that choice of starting right away rather than waiting for the most auspicious time. The moment you start, it will become the most auspicious moment because you are the author of that change. Other wise, a year from now, you will still be wishing you had started back! а year


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
